Travel documents

A valid Zimbabwean passport can be used to travel from the UK to Zimbabwe. If you do not have a passport an Emergency Travel Document (ETD) must be obtained. To obtain an ETD an applicant must attend an interview with officials from the Zimbabwean embassy. This can be arranged by the Home Office. Supporting evidence for the application can include:

- copies of passports
- · driving licence
- · birth certificate
- visa application details



Return

If you are willing to return and want to ensure that you are returned to Zimbabwe as soon as possible you can:

- Contact your caseworker at the Home Office to say that you are willing to return;
- Make every effort to find supporting documentation for issuing of travel documents;
- Make contact with the Zimbabwean Embassy to begin the process of obtaining a travel document.



You may find it useful to read the information below to begin preparing for your return.



Documentation in Zimbabwe

Zimbabweans over the age of 16 are required by law to carry evidence of identity with them whenever they are in a public place. This may be a national registration card, a driver's license or a passport.

All Zimbabweans are required to apply for National Registration when they turn 16. They will then be provided with an identity card. If you have lost or damaged your national identity card or your details have changed (citizenship status or marital status for example)you can apply for a replacement. For this you will require A 'long' birth certificate and your father's identity card, or, if your father has died, his death certificate. During the application process the applicant's fingerprints will be taken and photographs be taken. It is a requirement for any women having their photo taken that they not have 'artificial' hairstyles, which is interpreted as meaning both hair extensions or braids.

All children need a birth certificate to access healthcare and education. Children must be registered with the district registrar within 42 days of birth. It can be difficult to obtain birth certificates for children as a great deal of documentation is required from both parents and a record of the birth from the maternity home where the child was born, which can be withheld if the mother has an outstanding debt for the cost of the birth.



The General Registrar's Office deals with applications for both birth certificates and identity cards. There is a registrar's office in each region. For further information on obtaining identity documents you should contact your regional office:



Employment, education and training



Among the agency's activities are water and sanitation projects that have increased access to clean water and hygiene practices to an average of 70 percent of the community; ensuring secure, safe and healthy living conditions for families.

Caritas Zimbabwe's agriculture and food security programmes improves families livelihoods and increases their incomes through initiatives such as setting up community gardens, supplying seeds and equipment, and improving adaptation techniques to increase food crop yields.
